If you are 18 years of age or older and have registered to vote:

# YOU CAN VOTE

It's your right as an American citizen.

Don't let anybody tell you different.

#### ALL YOU NEED TO VOTE

You don't need your Voter Registration Card to vote. According to **KRS 117.227** "Election officers shall confirm the identity of each voter by personal acquaintance or by a document, such as a *motor vehicle operator's license, Social Security card, or credit card.*" However, any valid form of identification will be accepted.

#### IF YOU ARE CHALLENGED

**Do not walk away.** Sign the oath verifying your identity and right to vote. Then cast your ballot.

#### YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE CANNOT BE ARBITRARILY CHALLENGED

**KRS 117.316** requires challengers to have a "reason to believe" before they can make a challenge. **KRS 117.317** prohibits challengers from intimidating or harassing, verbally or otherwise, any voter; electioneering or campaigning on behalf of any candidate; disrupting activities from any polling place; or attempting to interfere with the proper conduct of the election.

#### DON'T BE SCARED OR INTIMIDATED

Do not allow anyone to take away your civil rights. If you witness any person or group turning voters away, call our legal team, toll-free, at 866-4-KY-VOTE. Voter intimidation or denying you your civil rights is a federal and state crime.

#### THERE IS NO VALID REASON TO DENY YOU THE RIGHT TO VOTE

As long as you are an American citizen and have registered in Kentucky at least thirty days prior to the election, and were born on or before 4 November 1985, and have not been convicted of a felony, **your right to vote cannot be denied.**

#### ASK FOR HELP

Persons who are physically disabled, blind or illiterate still have the right to vote. If you require assistance in marking your ballot, election workers are duty-bound to help you. Ask an officer at your precinct to assist you if you need it.

#### WHAT TO DO IF YOU HAVE PROBLEMS

1. **Do not walk away.** Voting is the most precious right you have as an American, and you shouldn't allow anyone to take it from you.
2. **Ask for help.** Election workers are there to answer any questions you may have. If an election worker tells you that you cannot vote, ask them to call the Board of Elections.
3. **Take this card with you.** Explain to poll workers that you know your rights.
